**Public Hearing on Local Law #4** – Mayor Hubbard said he'd first like to remind everyone of the protocol for public hearings that can be found on the back of the agenda. He specifically noted that each speaker will be limited to two minutes and he trusts courtesy will be honored. With documents displayed on the overhead screen, Mayor Hubbard explained how we got where we are by first reviewing a summary of input from the HLPC, ZBA and Planning Board. He noted that the Planning Board felt that "... expansion of the permitted temporary signage regulations could help..." and Chairman Kenan suggested that section III. A. be modified to read, "Community service, civic, non-profit and private owner household merchandise and event signs, not exceeding four square feet in area, for a period not exceeding eight days. Such signs may only be displayed on private property;...". Mayor Hubbard said that is important because of the letters from not-for-profits. He then reviewed excerpts from the draft local law, noting that IV. is a carry-over on gas stations. The HLPC suggested mock-up of a potential event signs, that could easily be changed, was displayed on the overhead screen. Mayor Hubbard asked if there are questions from the Board. Trustee Dove said the Downtown Committee has been working on the proposed local law and thought there was a couple of things that were going to change – in II. Portable Signs – add language "with in the public right-of-way"; in III. add the word Town. Relative to the word "premises", Trustee Stokes-Cawley said she'd like to see the definition included as she is not sure how restrictive it is. Mayor Hubbard opened the Public Hearing to the floor and the following is a brief synopsis of comments. **Kathie Dyson**, HLPC Member – HLPC discussed whole dilemma and

recognized that it can be tough to do business; HLPC want to give an alternative to the sandwich board signs that are out of control - take something away, give something back; displayed on the overhead screen samples of various signs; open to what would work; look at event banners so as to not have 100 sq. ft. banners lining building fronts up and down Genesee Street; hopes there can be a solution to give back something. **Steve Frackenpohl**, for the music festival – sandwich board only on days of concerts giving information as to time, location, etc.; 36 years' experience, hopes to be able to continue in 37<sup>th</sup> year. **Ted Kinder**, HLPC Member – elaborated on event signage; banners give specific dates, times, advertise specific events. **Tara Lynn**, Chamber of Commerce Executive Director – reviewed Skaneateles Chamber of Commerce suggested modifications as follows:

I. (2) Suggest that portable signs be allowed on “private property” or prohibited within the right of way”. Recognizes that plastic sandwich boards are not attractive, so encourages use of a uniform, natural material sandwich board for private property use.

II. A. What are the rules for off premise open house signs? Are they allowed between the sidewalk and street and/or on private property? For example, an open house on Lakeview Circle would need more than one open house sign to notify the public. Recommends allowing for additional off premise open house sign on private property and/or between the sidewalk and the street.

II. G. Ideal if bulletin board can accommodate 6 event signs, rather than 4. For example, July 7-10, 2016 there are 5 community events confirmed that the Chamber is aware of: Antique Show, Library Sale, Lavender Festival, Farmer's Market and Friday night Band Concert.

Suggested size: “shall not exceed 6 square feet” – allows for flexibility in approved design considerations.

What is the plan for the upcoming events (Curbstone Festival, Boat Show, Library, Antique...)? Can organizations continue to display event notifications until the bulletins are approved and in place?

III. “Temporary signs may only be placed on PRIVATE PROPERTY” – with the exception of event signs/non-commercial.

III. (A) Event “signs” (correct spelling). The Chamber is concerned with limiting to the “Village of Skaneateles”. This limits organizations such as the Mottville/Borodino Fire Departments, Lockwood Lavender Festival, Skaneateles Festival and Polo from advertising their events in the Village.

III. (B) Suggest changing “owner's property” to “private property” – similar to the Planning Board's recommendations. **Peg Whitehouse**, Barrow Gallery – operating for 116 years; agrees with Trustee Stokes-Cawley that premises needs to be clarified; too restrictive – all events (i.e. Borodino pancake breakfast, etc.) make up the texture/fabric of the community; ways we celebrate our life styles. Relative to the word premises, **John Crompt** said as the Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) he would interpret a premise as private property, as long as nothing is in the right-of-way. **Paula Conan**, for the Skaneateles Library – noted that the Gallery is separate from the library; restrictions changes way things have worked; concern about visibility for the public; has been given permission before - would change past practice; okay with limiting sandwich boards for commercial businesses; too much too quickly. **Andy Ramsgard** – CEO said interpret zoning – only ZBA can do that. **Trustee Eriksen** – clarifications can be made if necessary. **Atty. Pavlus** – noted that there is always going to be a level of interpretations with zoning. **Sarah Panzarella**, Imagine That – would like know whether or not sandwich board could go in front of shop in back of the sidewalk; clarify private property. **Molly Elliott**, Realtor – where has all this come from; why so many new rules? **Richard Schmidt**, Fleur-de-lis Florist – need to address premises; doesn't want signs protruding from buildings; talked about streetscape – let the buildings speak for themselves; signs on buildings don't try to outdo themselves; we can be unique – let's stay that way. **Patti Lindgren** – school functions on sandwich boards outside Community Bank. **Kim Pontello**, Texture Salon – colorful signs off to the side and done tastefully might attract people down Fennell Street. **David Lee** – belongs to four different organizations that would be affected; too far too fast with community event signs. **Rev. Tuttle**, Pastor of Methodist Church – problem with size of sign - 2' x 2' sign not big enough to attract business. **Dave Neibert**, Aristocats & Dogs – doesn't see where big problem is; Gallery 54, Grant Jewelers have small signs right up against buildings to draw visitors further up Genesee; is brick up to buildings public?; where is the line?; dog and water bowl sitting outside store as a way to attract business – is that considered a sign?; not advertising; need flexibility; don't see anything that's not in good taste; where does public and private stop and start?; a lot of stuff associated with businesses. **Bob Eggleston** – understands problem of sandwich board sign congestion in July on corner of Genesee and

Jordan – figure that out; II. A. off premise directional signs needs to be addressed; what about crop walk for walk through village; III. A. needs to be inclusive of entire community; III. B. owners property should be private property; public lands – have to get permission from Village Board.

With no additional comments from the floor, Mayor Hubbard thanked members from the three boards that came out tonight to hear the comments first hand. Trustee Stokes-Cawley made a motion to close the hearing. Trustee Dove noted that it is school vacation week so there may be a lot of people not here, so suggested leaving the public meeting open for written comments. Trustees Angelillo and Eriksen indicated that they are okay with that. Trustee Stokes-Cawley confirmed that written comments will be received until the Village Board Meeting of May 11, 2016. Mayor Hubbard thanked everyone for attending.

**CIP on the Krebs Restaurant** – Mayor Hubbard stated that the Critical Impact Public Hearing on the Krebs application for expansion of parking is re-scheduled to Wednesday, May 11, 2016, 8:00 p.m. at the Village Hall

**Minutes – Resolution #2016-81:** On the motion of Trustee Stokes-Cawley, seconded by Trustee Eriksen, it was resolved and carried (4-0 in favor with Trustee Angelillo abstaining as he was not present at the meeting) to approve the minutes of the Regular Meeting of April 14, 2016 and resolved and carried (5-0 in favor) to approve the minutes of the Operations Meeting of April 23, 2016, as presented. In discussing the resolution, Trustee Dove noted that the Minutes of the Public Hearing on April 14 reflects a synopsis of comments and is not verbatim. Clerk-Treasurer Couch confirmed that she does not do verbatim minutes like a court reporter that is occasionally hired for Public Meetings.

**Correspondence & Announcements** – Mayor Hubbard reviewed the following:

Mayor Hubbard thanked Clerk-Treasurer Couch for drafting the letters that the entire Board will sign in recognition and appreciation of the work our volunteers do.

Trustee Stokes-Cawley said this event has been going on for the past several years now and is a nice opportunity to paint. **Resolution #2016-82:** On the motion of Trustee Stokes-Cawley, seconded by Trustee Angelillo, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to approve Christy Lemp's request.

Recognizing that a resolution is needed for the Chamber of Commerce events, the Board asked Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Tara Lynn to review her April 18, 2016 letter. Director Lynn said the annual events that they would like to do once again in 2016, some of which require use of the park/sidewalks, are as follows:

- First Fridays May-December, 5-9 pm
- Merchant's Annual Curbstone Festival – July 21-23, including the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual Duck Dash on Friday, July 22 from 5-7 pm. Merchants have been notified that Curbstone Festival is a 3-day event, and tents should be taken down on Saturday night.
- Antique and Classic Boat Show – July 29-31.
- Fall Fest – October 1-2 with scarecrow making in Clift Park
- Dickens Christmas - weekends, November and December. Details to follow in the fall, as they become finalized. No major changes expected.

Director Lynn reported that the Foundation has been doing fundraising for the new docks that the community will be able to enjoy for the next 20-25 years. She said there is nothing new to highlight and thanked the Board for their continued support. **Resolution #2016-83:** On the motion of Trustee Dove, seconded by Trustee Angelillo, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to approve the events as outlined by Chamber Director Lynn.

**DMO** – Director of Municipal Operations (DMO) Harty said notification of paving the municipal lot has been sent to the Chamber, newspapers, Town Hall, etc. The resurfacing and striping will require the complete closure of the southern end, including several entrances from Monday, May 2 until Friday, May 6. Barricades with signage will be placed at the closed entrances to help direct people to the portion of the lot still open. DMO Harty said the Police have been asked not to enforce parking during this timeframe and signage will be on the pay stations next week indicating that parking will be free during the paving project. DMO Harty displayed a map on the overhead screen of the northern portion of the lot that will be open for public parking and the southern area that will be closed for pavement replacement. She asked for everyone's patience next week.

**VILLAGE HISTORIAN** – Village Historian Jorge Batlle delivered his Historian's Report for the first Quarter (insert). Pictures were displayed on the overhead screen and Historian Batlle read aloud his April Historic Moment as follows:

*"Microds" a combination of 'micro' meaning small and 'rods' from the words hot rod – is a small car.*

*Microds were the creation of Edwin "Bob" Robinson who lived on East Lake Street in the Village. In 1954 Robinson wanted to create a car for his summer visitor, a Fresh Air child from New York City. He wanted the car to be a 'woodshed' project using plywood and old lawn mower engines. The basic design was simple enough for a child 9-13 years old to build. They are 6½ ft. long, 37 inches wide, 50 inch wheelbase, 12 inch pneumatic tires, frame and body of wood bolts and screws. They are powered by a 4 cycle 1-2 hp. Single cylinder gas engines. They can reach speeds of 18-20 miles per hour.*

*In 1955 with over 26 cars having been made, they took to the streets and sidewalks of the Village. Safety became a big concern. Other places were then used such as the school parking lot and the school's running track. The parking lot did not work out as there was a shallow embankment on one side that drew the little buggies like a magnet. The running track's straight-a ways were so long and the turns were so easy that the fastest car simply took the lead and the race was over. Also, on such a large track the cars looked like they were hardly moving.*

*Mayor Stewart Smith and the Village Board were approached to allow racing in a section of a vacant, treed area of Austin Park. Robinson laid out a one-tenth mile (550 ft.) oval dirt track. A.S.*

*Wikstrom Company donated the time and machines to make the track. Local auto garages contributed old motor oil used for dust control. Later on the track was paved and maintained by Dougherty Construction Co. This track is where the Allyn Pavilion is now located.*

*Supervised races were held twice a week – 7 pm Wednesday evenings and 2 pm Saturday afternoons, during the summer months. There was no charge to the audience. Some events attracted 1600 enthusiasts. Each racer had a pit-man or pit-girl, who assisted him when necessary. Each racer wore a hard hat for protection. Fortunately there were no serious accidents during the years of racing. Races consisted of 5 heats of 8 laps each. The Elimination round was 12 laps and the Feature race was 25 laps.*

*Microd racing created considerable interest in neighboring communities. They developed their own Microd programs. In 1955, Skaneateles racers were invited to race at the New York State Fair. Twenty cars got to race in front of the grandstand. Every racer got a trophy and they were a hit. The national magazine "Look" ran a photo feature in the Fall 1955 issue, 'putting Skaneateles on the map.'*

*In the late 1950s two classes of Microds were established – the MR-1 and the MR-2. The latter was a faster car for drivers 14-17 years old.*

*Popularity locally began to decline in the early 1960s, and the last race was held in 1964. The reason for the decline can only be guessed at. Some blame the over-participation by adults who wanted the sport to be more competitive. Some say that the addition of roll bars and other safety equipment took much of the fun out of it. In 1969 the old deteriorated track was removed.*

*The New York State Microd Association was formed in 1956. They standardized the rules, developed a plan book and motor specs and provide insurance of drivers. Today, they also coordinate the*

*appearances of clubs at the State Fair. Eight Microd racing clubs exist today in Upstate New York.*

Mayor Hubbard thanked Historian Batlle for his report and noted that he had his own historic moment in using the overhead screen for his report – a first that was an affective presentation.

**Status of NYSERDA Grant** – Mayor Hubbard noted this item stays on the agenda until complete.

**Status of Annexation of W. Genesee Street / Mirbeau** – Mayor Hubbard noted this item also stays on the agenda until complete.

**Status of Downtown Committee** – Trustee Dove reported two new members – Chris Grillo from The Bakery and Nickie Marquis from the Skaneateles Library.

**Status of Renewal of Time Warner Cable TV Franchise Agreement** – Mayor Hubbard said Clerk to the Boards Dennis Dundon will be the Village representative.

**Status of Community Center / Lot Line Adjustment** – Mayor Hubbard said this item will be on the agenda until complete.

**Status of Public Hearing on Local Law – Downtown D Parking Requirements** – Mayor Hubbard said there isn't any news as this topic will be before the Planning Board on May 5.

**Searing Fitness Triathlon Training Program** – Mayor Hubbard said this is an annual request and recognized Candy Searing who said she is present on Dick's behalf should anyone have any questions. **Resolution #2016-84:** On the motion of Trustee Angelillo, seconded by Trustee Dove, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to approve of Searing Fitness Triathlon Training Program utilizing Clift Park for the purpose of conducting a 2016 Summer Triathlon Training Program as outlined in Dick Searing's April 21, 2016 request.

**Schedule CIP Public Hearing for Goode Residence, 43 Fennell Street** – **Resolution #2016-85:** On the motion of Mayor Hubbard, seconded by Trustee Dove, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in

favor) to schedule a Public Hearing on Critical Impact Permit for the Goode residence at 43 Fennell Street on Wednesday, May 11, 2016 at 8:30 p.m.

**Arbor Day Proclamation – Resolution #2016-86: Proclaiming Friday, April 29, 2016 as Arbor Day in the Village of Skaneateles:** On the motion of Mayor Hubbard, seconded by Trustee Stokes-Cawley, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to adopt the resolution read aloud by Mayor Hubbard as follows:

*Whereas*, in 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees, and

*Whereas*, this holiday, called Arbor Day, was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska, and

*Whereas*, Arbor Day is now observed throughout the nation and the world, and

*Whereas*, trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife, and

*Whereas*, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires, and beautify our community, and

*Whereas*, trees in our village increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community, and

*Whereas*, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal.

*Now, Therefore*, I, Martin L. Hubbard, Mayor of the Village of Skaneateles, do hereby proclaim Friday, April 29, 2016 as Arbor Day in the Village of Skaneateles, and I urge all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day and to support efforts to protect our trees and woodland, and

*Further*, I urge all citizens to plant trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this and future generations.

**Confirm Skaneateles Fire Department Elections** – Mayor Hubbard acknowledged that the Board has copies of the SFD Elections and noted that Trustee Dove made the list as a Honorary Member.

**Resolution #2016-87:** On the motion of Trustee Dove, seconded by Trustee Stokes-Cawley, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to confirm the Skaneateles Volunteer Fire Department 2016 Elections and accept the roster of SFD Officers and Members.

**Schedule Public Hearing on Local Law #6 of 2016 – Resolution #2016-88:** On the motion of Mayor Hubbard, seconded by Trustee Angelillo, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) to authorize Publication of Notice of a Public Hearing on Local Law #6 of 2016 – Reduction of Mayor's Salary to \$5,000.00 on Thursday, May 26, 2016, 8:00 p.m. at Village Hall.

**Resolution of Levy** – DMO Harty said this is the resolution of levy relative to unpaid utilities – Electric and PPA in the total amount of \$78,937.74 and Water, Sewer, and UV totaling \$34,657.09 will be levied to the property owners' Village tax bill. Clerk/Treasurer Couch noted that these amounts are less than in previous years.

Whereas the budget of the Village of Skaneateles for the fiscal year beginning June 1, 2016, was duly completed and adopted on April 14, 2016, and that amount to be raised by general village tax has been determined and will be extended and carried out upon the roll by the Village Clerk, as provided by law, and

Whereas, certain special or local assessments heretofore levied against certain property remaining unpaid will also be extended and carried out upon the roll by said clerk, pursuant to subdivision #5 of Section #5-508 of the Village Law, as amended,

Whereas, unpaid water, sewer and electric bills become a lien on the real property on April 15<sup>th</sup> and an additional 10% penalty will be added to the unpaid balance, **Resolution #2016- 89:** Now therefore, on the motion of Mayor Hubbard, seconded by Trustee Angelillo, it was resolved and unanimously carried (5-0 in favor) that the taxes upon the present assessment roll be and hereby are levied against the

respective properties herein described, and in the manner therein provided, according to the law, and it is further resolved that a duly executed warrant be annexed to each duplicate copy of said tax assessment roll and that the Village Clerk deliver one such copy to the Treasurer of the Village on or before the 15<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2016, for collection pursuant to Section #1426 of the Real Property Tax Law.

It is further resolved that the Clerk/Treasurer is ordered to include with these minutes to be approved at the Regular Meeting of the Village Board on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of May, the list of unpaid utility accounts as of April 15, 2016, being levied with taxes.


**Public Comment** – Mayor Hubbard asked for public comment; there was none.
